Further connect water, women, and peace in Liberia

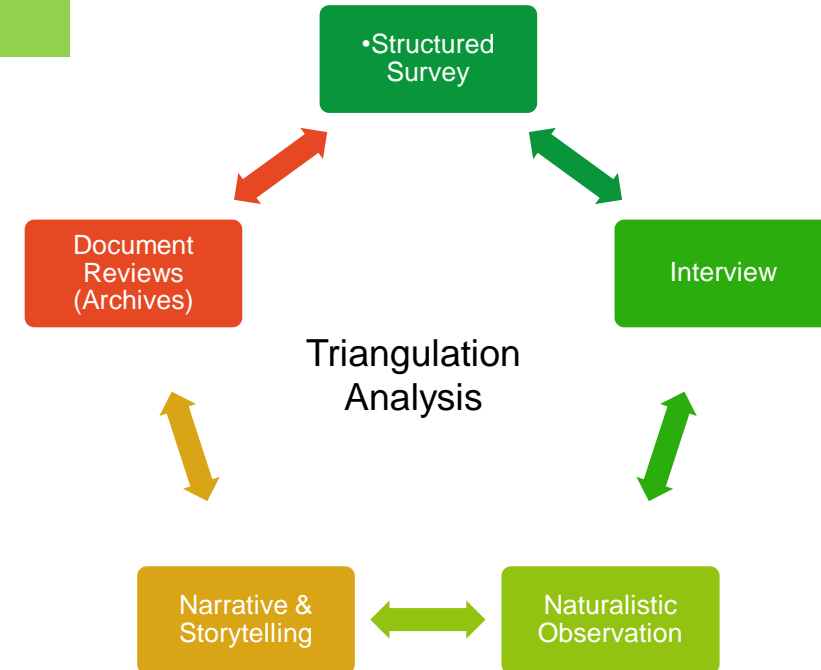
Research Questions

1. To what extent can water access be used as a vehicle for peace and political stability?
2. Ownership over customary land includes ownership of the natural resources on the land such as water resources. **What impact have land ownership have on communities' ability to access water resources in Liberia?**
3. Women played a significant role in fighting for peace and bear the primary responsibility for water collection in Liberia. **How can women organising respond to the challenges of water security and peace in Liberia?**

Methods

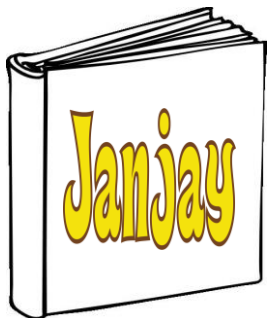
The nature of the study will apply mixed-methods research design and combine data from

- Archival Research
- Structured Survey
- Interviews
- Narratives and Storytelling
- Naturalistic Observation



Co-Production

Publish children's book to reflect the lived experiences of Liberian communities' water access challenges as it relates to landownership. The fictional plot will centre on the narratives of Liberians. 10% proceeds to support women's organisations.



Results from the survey will produce a report to be submitted to the Government of Liberia for policy development.
